

### **The Electoral College**

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The Office of the Federal Register (OFR) is a part of the National Archives and Records Administration (NARA). On behalf of the Archivist of the United States, it accepts official certificates from the States and coordinates certain functions between the States and Congress. These duties are ministerial — non-partisan and apolitical.

The OFR has been delegated to carry out these duties since 1952, first by the Administrator of the General Services Administration (NARA was then the National Archives and Records Service - NARS) when they were transferred from the Department of State, and then by the Archivist when NARA became its own agency for the second time.



## **Background**

**States** elect the president

Voters in each state vote for the presidential candidate and vice presidential candidate they want their State to elect.

In most States the candidate with the most votes wins the State's electoral college votes





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

allocated to the District of Columbia




## Constitutional Qualifications Of Electors

- Senator or Representative,
- Person holding an Office of Trust or Profit under the United States, or
- State official who engaged in insurrection or rebellion against the United States or given aid and comfort to its enemies.
  - This prohibition relates to the post-Civil War era.

## Selecting Electors



- the political parties nominate electors at their State party conventions or by a vote of the party's central committee in each State.
- The electors' names may or may not appear on the ballot below the name of the candidates running for President, depending on the procedure in each State.

### Most States are winner take all Maine and Nebraska

 2 electors chosen at large all others chosen by Congressional district.

1<sup>st</sup> Tuesday after 1<sup>st</sup> Monday in November—Election Day

By 6 days before meeting of the electors—States issue Certificates of Ascertainment (appointing electors)

1<sup>st</sup> Tuesday after 2<sup>nd</sup> Wednesday—electors vote (meeting of the electors)

4<sup>th</sup> Wednesday in December—electoral votes must arrive


On or before January 3—Archivist transfers Certificates to Congress, as requested

January 6—Congress counts electoral votes

January 20, at Noon—Inauguration

1<sup>st</sup> Tuesday after 1<sup>st</sup> Monday in November—Election Day November 5, 2024





By 6 days before meeting of the electors—State executives issue Certificates of Ascertainment (appointing electors)

December 11, 2024





### **BEFORE Election Day**

### The Archivist –

✓ Reminds each responsible State\* executive (currently all Governors and the Mayor of the District of Columbia) of the procedural requirements

### OFR -

- ✓ Contacts House and Senate Parliamentarians, the Clerk of the House, and the Secretary of the Senate to re-establish procedures for communication
- √ Updates website and State instructions
- ✓ Establishes points of contact for each State


NATIONAL ARCHIVES and RECORDS ADMINISTRATION \*Under the 23<sup>rd</sup> amendment, DC is treated as a State for Electoral College purposes.

### General Election – November 5, 2024

NATIONAL ARCHIVES

Office of the
Federal Register

- Prepare **SEVEN original** "Certificates of Ascertainment"
- Send to the Archivist.





## Issue and distribute Certificates of Ascertainment

No later than 6 days BEFORE the meeting of the electors

The States' executives issue 7 duplicate original Certificates of Ascertainment and distribute them:

- ✓ Send 1 Certificate of Ascertainment to Archivist
- ✓ Retain the remaining 6 Certificates of Ascertainment for the meeting of electors

OFR makes the Certificates of Ascertainment publicly available on the website after verifying facial validity



### Certificate of Ascertainment

Lists the names of the individuals appointed as electors and the number of votes they received.


Lists the names of all other individuals and the number of votes they received.

### Washington D.C. 2016 Certificate of Ascertainment





### <u>BEFORE</u> electors vote: Prepare Certificates of Vote

- √ 6 originals
- ✓ Names of the electors typed below their signature lines
- ✓ Certificates dated
- ✓ Original (or certified copies of) documentation regarding replacement electors (if needed) to pair with each original Certificate
- √ No typos

## Meeting of the Electors - December 17, 2024



Generally, each
State's electors vote
at their respective
State capitols.

Each State determines whether or not the voting is open to the public






### Meeting of the electors:

- ✓ Prepare Certificates of Vote\*
- ✓ Vote
- ✓ Pair Certificates of Ascertainment with Certificates of Vote
- ✓ Package and distribute paired Certificates of Ascertainment and Certificates of Vote

<sup>\*</sup> If allowing write-in votes, make sure electors include the State of residence for any additional vote recipient.

### Faithless Electors





Do not vote for the candidate they pledged to vote for

Some States require electors to vote as they pledged and can replace an elector at the meeting

No Federal requirements or pledges, so this is a State concept

### Meeting of the Electors - December 17, 2024



The electors record their votes on **SIX original** "Certificates of Vote,"

paired with the remaining six original "Certificates of Ascertainment."

The electors sign, seal and certify the packages of electoral votes and immediately send them t Federal and State





### **Send Packages of Certificates**

- ✓ 1 pair to President of the Senate
- ✓ 2 pairs to Archivist of the United States
- ✓ 2 pairs to each State's Chief Election Officer (typically the Secretary of State)
- ✓ 1 pair to the Chief Judge of the Federal District Court located where the electors met

Retain any tracking numbers



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4<sup>th</sup> Wednesday in December—electoral votes must arrive

**December 25, 2024** (effectively December 26, 2024 to account for Federal holiday)



### Receipt of the Certificates - December 25, 2024

The proper Federal and State officials must have the electoral votes in hand.





Statutory deadline for designated Federal and State officials to receive paired Certificates is **8 days** after the meeting of the electors.

OFR can make demands on the Chief Election Officer of the State and the U.S. Federal District Judge who received the backup Certificate pairs, as necessary, to replace lost or delayed Certificate pairs for both the Archivist and for Congress.



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## Transmission of Certificates to Congress

January 3, 2025

As the new Congress assembles, the Archivist transmits any original sets of the Certificates to Congress upon request
